Gospel Reading John 20:1-23 ESV

The Holy Gospel is from St. John, the 20th chapter. Glory to You, O Lord.

1 Now on the first day of the week Mary Magdalene came to the tomb early, while it was still dark, and saw that the stone had been taken away from the tomb. 2 So she ran and went to Simon Peter and the other disciple, the one whom Jesus loved, and said to them, "They have taken the Lord out of the tomb, and we do not know where they have laid him." 3 So Peter went out with the other disciple, and they were going toward the tomb. 4 Both of them were running together, but the other disciple outran Peter and reached the tomb first. 5 And stooping to look in, he saw the linen cloths lying there, but he did not go in. 6 Then Simon Peter came, following him, and went into the tomb. He saw the linen cloths lying there, 7 and the face cloth, which had been on Jesus' head, not lying with the linen cloths but folded up in a place by itself. 8 Then the other disciple, who had reached the tomb first, also went in, and he saw and believed; 9 for as yet they did not understand the Scripture, that he must rise from the dead. 10 Then the disciples went back to their homes.

11 But Mary stood weeping outside the tomb, and as she wept she stooped to look into the tomb. 12 And she saw two angels in white, sitting where the body of Jesus had lain, one at the head and one at the feet. 13 They said to her, "Woman, why are you weeping?" She said to them, "They have taken away my Lord, and I do not know where they have laid him." 14 Having said this, she turned around and saw Jesus standing, but she did not know that it was Jesus. 15 Jesus said to her, "Woman, why are you weeping? Whom are you seeking?" Supposing him to be the gardener, she said to him, "Sir, if you have carried him away, tell me where you have laid him, and I will take him away." 16 Jesus said to her, "Mary." She turned and said to him in Aramaic, "Rabboni!" (which means Teacher). 17 Jesus said to her, "Do not cling to me, for I have not yet ascended to the Father; but go to my brothers and say to them, I am ascending to my Father and your Father, to my God and your God."" 18 Mary Magdalene went and announced to the disciples, "I have seen the Lord"—and that he had said these things to her.

19 On the evening of that day, the first day of the week, the doors being locked where the disciples were for fear of the Jews, Jesus came and stood among them and said to them, "Peace be with you." 20 When he had said this, he showed them his hands and his side. Then the disciples were glad when they saw the Lord. 21 Jesus said to them again, "Peace be with you. Teaching

On the evening of that day, the first day of the week, the doors being locked where the disciples were for fear of the Jews, Jesus came and stood among them and said to them, "Peace be with you." When he had said this, he showed them his hands and his side. Then the disciples were glad when they saw the Lord. (John 20:19-20)

May the words of my mouth, and the meditations of our hearts be acceptable to You O Lord, our Rock and our Redeemer.

More than a billion people in our communities, nation and countries around the world are shut in our houses. At the time of writing this devotion, the coronavirus has infected more than 1.5

million people and killed almost 90,000. And we know the numbers are higher, and will be higher. In some areas doctors and nurses are overwhelmed with patients.

Governments around the world fear that the infection could spread too fast, medical care systems could be overwhelmed and even more people could die. People around the world are ordered to stay in their homes to try to slow the spread of the disease.

Death is real. Often people try to pretend they are not worried about death, that it is far away from their lives. But death is always near. Death and illness are real. Governments around the world have changed the ways their citizens are living, have changed their economies, have changed laws, all to try to slow down illness and death.

The disciples of Jesus were afraid. They saw Jesus killed on a cross. They knew they could face death next from the leaders who had Jesus killed. Would they also die now? They were afraid and they were locked inside a room to hide.

In very midst of being afraid of death, locked in a room, Jesus appeared to them all and said "Peace be with you." But they had seen Jesus nailed to the cross. They had seen a spear thrust into Jesus' body. Was this the same Jesus they knew? How could He be here now with them?

Yes. This was the same Jesus. He had the nail and spear marks. He was not dead, but alive. Jesus had overcome death itself.

Jesus forgave all sin on the cross. Jesus overcame all evil powers that wanted Him dead forever. Jesus overcame death itself and lives. Jesus wanted his disciples to know this and believe it. Even in the midst of fears and threats of death, Jesus wanted them to have His peace.

Fear of death is not pointless because death is real. The resurrection of Jesus Christ shows us that God does not want to abandon us to fear and death. He wants us to be at peace for He is with us. Evil and death do not have the final word, Jesus does.

John 11:23-27 Jesus said to her [Martha], "Your brother will rise again." Martha said to him, "I know that he will rise again in the resurrection on the last day." Jesus said to her, "I am the resurrection and the life. Whoever believes in me, though he die, yet shall he live, and everyone who lives and believes in me shall never die. Do you believe this?" She said to him, "Yes, Lord; I believe that you are the Christ, the Son of God, who is coming into the world."

Please pray with me: Dear Lord Jesus Christ, Sometimes even I am afraid of death. The whole world is afraid of the pandemic now. I ask You to give me Your peace. And I ask for Your healing. And help me share this with others as well. In Your name I pray, Jesus. Amen.

Now may the peace of God that passes all understanding guard our hearts and minds in Christ Jesus, our Lord. Amen.
