Invocation and Opening Verses

Scripture Reading John 12:12-19 ESV

12 The next day the large crowd that had come to the feast heard that Jesus was coming to Jerusalem. 13 So they took branches of palm trees and went out to meet him, crying out, "Hosanna! Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord, even the King of Israel!" 14 And Jesus found a young donkey and sat on it, just as it is written,

15 "Fear not, daughter of Zion; behold, your king is coming, sitting on a donkey's colt!"

16 His disciples did not understand these things at first, but when Jesus was glorified, then they remembered that these things had been written about him and had been done to him. 17 The crowd that had been with him when he called Lazarus out of the tomb and raised him from the dead continued to bear witness. 18 The reason why the crowd went to meet him was that they heard he had done this sign. 19 So the Pharisees said to one another, "You see that you are gaining nothing. Look, the world has gone after him."

### **Teaching**

John 12:16 "His disciples did not understand these things at first, but when Jesus was glorified, then they remembered that these things had been written about him and had been done to him."

May the words of my mouth, and the meditations of our hearts be acceptable to You oh Lord, our Rock and our Redeemer.

As indicated many times in the Gospels, during the time of His earthly ministry the disciples of Jesus did not understand the meaning, power, application and fulfillments of Jesus' teachings and deeds. In this instance of Jesus' entry into Jerusalem, the praises of the crowds, Jesus' riding on a young donkey, the fulfillment of the prophecy from Zechariah chapter 9 – the disciples did not understand the significance of these, until after Jesus' death and resurrection.

The crowds understood Jesus was special, different and even powerful. They were impressed that Jesus raised Lazarus from the dead. But the crowds did not understand that to save the people of Israel, and to save all people, Jesus would have to be humiliated, betrayed, denied, rejected, suffer, die and rise again. The crowds wanted Jesus to be a king and savior in the way they wanted and in the way they understood.

But at His trial before Pilate, Jesus said:

"My kingdom is not of this world. If my kingdom were of this world, my servants would have been fighting, that I might not be delivered over to the Jews. But my kingdom is not from the world." Then Pilate said to him, "So you are a king?" Jesus answered, "You say that I am a king. For this purpose I was born and for this purpose I have come into the world—to bear witness to the truth. Everyone who is of the truth listens to my voice." Pilate said to him, "What is truth?" (John 18:36-38)

Pilate was surprised Jesus was rejected by His own people. Pilate recognized that if Jesus was after an earthly kingdom of power, Jesus would be a threat to the Rome rulers. But Jesus

was not a threat to any human kingdom, Jesus called people to God's eternal kingdom – which is not of human making, but is of God's making.

No less today, our human minds alone cannot understand God's kingdom and Jesus' kingship without God's Word and Spirit. So often we might expect God to work through powers, wealth and wisdom that humans expect and look to every day. People look to fulness in this earthly life as the ultimate good.

God does care about our conditions in this life, and we bring our daily concerns to Him in Jesus' name. But God also wants us to be in fellowship with Him not only in this life, but forever. Our lives are now disrupted from the normal ways we used to live before the coronavirus pandemic. We are tempted to think God is no longer in control, or that He only wants to punish, or that He has abandoned us. But this is a wrong understanding about God's work in our lives and in the world.

Paul said in Romans chapter 8, "He who did not spare his own Son but gave him up for us all, how will he not also with him graciously give us all things?"

Jesus calls us to trust His sacrificial death and His victorious resurrection. We humans usually think in terms of kingdoms that are powerful in this life only. Jesus calls us to trust Him through the good and bad of this life, to look to life in His eternal kingdom.

As we trust in Jesus, and we look forward to eternal life, we also are called to love and take care of our neighbors in this life. We want to try to help people in their situations today. But at the same time, Jesus calls us to know and believe the conditions of this world are not the end. Jesus is watching over us not only through the troubles of today and tomorrow, but He is carrying us through all things into His eternal kingdom.

Please pray with me: Dear Lord Jesus, give me faith and understanding of Your kingdom. Help me to firmly believe that You hold all things in Your hands. Amen.

Now may the peace of God that passes all understanding guard our hearts and minds in Christ Jesus, our Lord. Amen.

We bring before You all firefighters, emergency and medical workers, law-enforcement, state and local government officials, health department workers, National Guard and members of the Reserve armed forces now called upon to assist the nation. We bring before You workers in food production, food and pharmacy distribution, utility workers and all other essential workers. Lord, in Your mercy, **hear our prayer.** 

Merciful Lord, Your grace is sufficient for all our needs, and You have promised to be the strength of the weary, the hope of those who fear, the healing of the ill, the fullness of those disabled, and the peace of all who are distressed. Hear us on behalf of our nation and the world suffering pandemic and isolation. We pray especially for \_\_\_\_\_\_ and all whom we name in our hearts, that they may be well supplied by Your grace in every time of trouble; Lord, in Your mercy, hear our prayer.
