Lutheran Church Missouri Synod – Ministry to the Armed Forces Sunday, May 15, 2022

Our Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod's "Ministry to the Armed Forces" (MAF) is a crucial part of our synod's work. The U.S. military takes persons from established religious organizations; one cannot just go in and be a free-lance chaplain. One has to be trained and approved by a religious organization to even be considered by the military to be a Chaplain. Moreover, the sending religious organization protects and limits the work of its Chaplains. My son, Chaplain Paul Rockrohr, is bound to the teachings and practices of the LCMS. He helps all Sailors and Marines of all beliefs in many ways, but his teaching and pastoral care aligns with LCMS teaching. In fact, US Navy regulations for Chaplains are that they must abide by the teachings of their sending religious organization. That is, if a sending organization is a conservative Lutheran church the Navy requires the Chaplains from that organization to be conservative Lutheran. If the sending organization is Sunni Muslim, the Chaplain must do all things according to the beliefs of a Sunni Muslim, and so forth.

Our LCMS Chaplains have many opportunities for Christian outreach and they support the work of the men and women of our military in many ways. They provide moral and ethical support roles for their Commanding Officers, as well as take care of the religious and physiological care of the men and women in their unit.

There is no other budgeted synod money which supports the salaries and program costs of LCMS MAF except direct donors. So not only do Rev. Craig Muelher, Rev. Dr. Steven Hokane and Alicia Hinton (all retired military) recruit, train and support our LCMS Chaplains (and their families) throughout their military careers, they also have to fund-raise for their own salaries and all their program costs. Any donations to LCMS Ministry to the Armed Forces goes to support the MAF program costs and the salaries of these three people.



On May 16, LCMS Chaplain Gregory Todd was promoted to the Chief of Chaplains of the U.S. Navy. This means he has charge of all Chaplains of all beliefs in the Navy, Marines and Coast Guard. What a blessing and opportunity our synod has to serve our men and women all branches of the U.S. military! Without the staff and work of the LCMS Office of the Ministry to the Armed Forces such opportunities could not happen.
